NOTIFICATION OF GRANT OF PLANNING PERMISSION

PROPOSALS: Change of use of agricultural land to domestic garden (718 sqm) and to alter an existing access to create a driveway to the property and agricultural land.

LOCATION: Tremel, Rue A Ronde Cheminee, Castel.

APPLICANT: Mr K Le Poidevin & Mr G Le Poidevin

This permission is granted under the terms of Sections 15 and 16 of the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law, 2005 (the 'Law').

Conditions and reasons:-

1.All development authorised by this permission must be carried out and must be completed in every detail in accordance with the written application, plans and drawings referred to above. No variations to such development amounting to development may be made without the permission of the Authority under the Law.

Reason - To ensure that it is clear that permission is only granted for the development to which the application relates.

2.The development hereby permitted shall be begun within 3 years from the date of grant of this permission.

Reason - This condition reflects section 18(1) of the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law, 2005 which states that planning permission ceases to have effect unless development is commenced within 3 years of the date of grant (or such shorter period as may be specified in the permission).

3.The development hereby permitted and all the operations which constitute or are incidental to that development must be carried out in compliance with all such requirements of The Building (Guernsey) Regulations, 2012 as are applicable to them, and no operation to which such a requirement applies may be commenced or continued unless (i) plans relating to that operation have been approved by the Authority and (ii) it is commenced or, as the case may be, continued, in accordance with that requirement and any further requirements imposed by the Authority when approving those plans, for the purpose of securing that the building regulations are complied with.

Reason - Any planning permission granted under the Law is subject to this condition as stated in section 17(2) of the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law, 2005.

4.The landscaping scheme shall be fully completed, in accordance with the details shown on Plan 7884-01 B2, by the end of the next planting season following the grant of consent (by 31st March 2026). Any trees or plants removed, dying, being severely damaged or becoming seriously diseased, within 5 years of planting shall be replaced in the following planting season by trees or plants of a size and species similar to those originally required to be planted.

Reason - To make sure that the appearance of the completed development is satisfactory and to help assimilate the development into its surroundings and to provide biodiversity enhancements in accordance with the Strategy for Nature SPG.

5.Please note this is one condition with multiple sub-sections:

(i) No development shall commence on site (including demolition and site works) until there has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Authority:

(a) A desktop study documenting all the previous and existing land uses of the site and adjacent land in accordance with national guidance as set out in Land Contamination Risk Management (LCRM) and BS10175:2001+A2:2017 - Investigation of Potentially Contaminated Sites - Code of Practice;

and unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Authority,

(b) a site investigation report documenting the ground conditions of the site and incorporating chemical and gas analysis identified as appropriate by the desk top study in accordance with BS10175;

and, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Authority,

(c) a detailed scheme for remedial works and measures to be undertaken to avoid risk from contaminants and/or gases when the site is developed and proposals for future maintenance and monitoring. Such scheme shall include nomination of a competent person to oversee the implementation of the works.

(ii) If determined to be required the development hereby permitted shall not be occupied or brought into use until there has been submitted to the Authority verification by a competent person approved under the provisions of subsection (i)c of this condition that any remediation scheme required and approved under the provisions of subsection (i)c of this condition has been implemented fully in accordance with the approved details (unless varied with the written agreement of the Authority in advance of implementation). Unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Authority such verification shall comprise:

- a) as built drawings of the implemented scheme;
- b) photographs of the remediation works in progress;
- c) certificates demonstrating that imported and/or material left in situ is free from contamination.

Thereafter the scheme shall be monitored and maintained in accordance with the scheme approved under subsection (i) c. of this condition

Reason - To make sure that the site, when developed is free from contamination, in the interests of public health and safety.

6. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Land Planning and Development (Exemptions) Ordinance, 2023 (or any other Ordinance replacing or re-enacting that Ordinance), no gate, fence, wall or other means of enclosure (other than any hereby expressly permitted) shall be erected, constructed or placed on the southern boundary of the extended residential garden area as hereby approved.

Reason - In view of the sensitive nature of the site, the erection of such structures as 'exempt development' may have an adverse visual impact. This condition is imposed to make sure that any proposals can be properly considered.

Expiry Date: This permission will cease to have effect on 04/03/2028 unless development is commenced by that date.

ADVICE AND OTHER REMARKS:-

Please note the installation of the field gate has not formed part of the assessment of this application. Should the gate exceed 1.2m in height, a separate permission will be required prior to its installation.

With reference to condition 5 a desktop study shall be the very minimum standard accepted. Pending the results of the desktop study, the applicant may have to satisfy the requirements of criteria (b) and (c) of that condition, however, this will all be confirmed in writing.

The phased risk assessment should be carried out also in accordance with the procedural guidance and UK policy.

The site is known to be or suspected to be contaminated. Please be aware that the responsibility for the safe development and secure occupancy of the site rests with the developer.

It is strongly recommended that in submitting details in accordance with the above condition that the applicant has reference to Land Contamination risk management available at <https://www.gov.uk/guidance/land-contamination-risk-management>.

If, during development, contamination not previously identified is found to be present at the site then no further development shall be carried out until the developer has submitted to the Authority a method statement to identify, risk assess and address the unidentified contaminants, and obtained written agreement from the Authority for the works to continue. Any subsequent works shall be carried out only in accordance with the conclusions and recommendations contained in the agreed report.

Effect of planning permission:

Section 18 of the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law, 2005 ('the Law') defines the effect of the planning permission hereby granted, namely:

- (1) Planning permission ceases to have effect unless the development permitted by it is commenced within a period of three years immediately following the date on which it is granted (or such shorter period as may be specified in the permission).
- (2) Planning permission enures for the benefit of the land concerned and of every person for the time being having an interest in it.
- (3) Any conditions subject to which planning permission is issued are enforceable in accordance with the provisions of Part V of the Law.
- (4) Planning permission for the erection of a building is only permission to use it for the purpose specified in the permission or, subject to any restriction so specified, for any other purpose for which it is designed.
- (5) Planning permission is only permission to carry out the development specified in it (subject to any conditions so specified), and does not imply the giving of any

other approval or consent required under this Law or any other enactment or under any rule of law.

Right of appeal against planning decisions:

Your attention is drawn to the provisions of Section 68(1) of the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law 2005, which provides a right of appeal, on the merits against a decision to grant planning permission subject to conditions (except a building condition), to the Planning Tribunal, which is independent of the States of Guernsey. An appeal to the Planning Tribunal under section 68 of the Law against this decision must be made before the expiry of the period of six months beginning with the date on which the Authority made this decision. Brief Description of the site:

The application site comprises a detached pre-1900 construction traditional residential property situated to the south of Rue De La Ronde Cheminee. Surrounding the site the area comprises residential properties to the north, east and west, with a section of agricultural land to the south. Beyond the agricultural land are residential properties.

The site is situated Outside of the Centres as designated in the Island Development Plan.

By letter dated 13th March 2025 stated the following:

"I have reviewed the proposed plans for Tremel which were received by email on 10th February 2025 and there are a number of issues of concern that I must raise. The land parcel has had greenhouse on the site. Although historic records indicate these

greenhouses were cold, I would still have concerns for land contamination from metals and pesticides from their agricultural/horticultural use. As such, I believe a full contaminated land condition should be applied to the application.

Potential Land Contamination:

and unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Authority,

and, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Authority,

(c) a detailed scheme for remedial works and measures to be undertaken to avoid risk from contaminants and/or gases when the site is developed and proposals for future maintenance and monitoring. Such scheme shall include nomination of a competent person to oversee the implementation of the works.

Any subsequent works shall be carried out only in accordance with the conclusions and recommendations contained in the agreed report.*

I would be grateful if these issues are considered during the determination of this application.”

Conclusion/Brief comment:

Planning permission is sought to change the use of a section of agricultural land (circa 718m²) to domestic garden, to be used in association with the main dwelling (Tremel). The remainder of the field to the south will remain in agricultural use. An

existing track is included in this proposal, providing access to the main dwelling and a new field gate installed to allow access from the track to the remaining agricultural land. Provided that the field gate does not exceed 1.2m in height then planning permission would not be required and should planning permission be granted, it is recommended that an informative be included to advise the applicant of this. Existing disused oil and water tanks will also be removed from the agricultural land.

The section of land the subject of this application together with remaining agricultural land to the south, previously formed a glasshouse site. The agricultural land which as part of this application will be retained for agriculture purpose has been cleared of all glass and superstructures (supporting walls frames and glass etc). However, part of the superstructure of a former glasshouse (the supporting walls for the glass) remain on the section of land the subject of this application.

Supplementary Planning Guidance: Defining Redundant Glasshouse Sites: (December 2018), defines a redundant glasshouse site as *“one where there is visible evidence of substantial superstructures still remaining on the site, the clearance of which will have a positive impact on visual amenity and landscape quality and character.”* The SPG states that this assessment will be made on a *“case by case basis”*. In this instance the walls comprise dwarf walls circa 1m in height, which are not considered to be substantial structures, are largely unseen from public vantage points in the surrounding area, and their clearance would not have a positive impact on the visual amenity and landscape quality and character of the surrounding area. Therefore, the site is not considered to be a redundant glasshouse site and policy OC7: Redundant Glasshouse Sites would not be engaged in this particular instance.

In respect of the change of use to domestic garden, this parcel of land is enclosed by residential development to the north, east and west. The extent of curtilage proposed would level off the site and be consistent with the neighbouring property to the west. The wall that is to remain would provide a suitable boundary feature to demarcate the residential garden area and to separate it from the remainder of the agriculture land to the south.

To ensure that the proposal does not affect the landscape character and openness of the surrounding area, it is recommended that a condition is included to remove exemption rights for the construction of any walls or fences along the southern boundary of the curtilage as hereby extended. Subject to the condition, the proposed change of use would not therefore have an adverse impact on open land or landscape character and is not located within an Area of Biodiversity or Agriculture Priority Area. No boundary features will be altered as a result of the proposal and there will be no adverse impacts on neighbouring residents. The proposed change of use would therefore accord with Policies GP1 (Landscape character and open land) and GP15 (Creation and extension of curtilage).

Although the site is not located in an Area of Biodiversity Importance, in line with the States' Strategy for Nature, 2020, which has been adopted as Supplementary Planning Guidance, the application must be accompanied by information demonstrating environmental benefits in respect of biodiversity that will be

incorporated should planning permission be granted. This should relate to biodiversity benefits within the proposed area of domestic garden.

The application drawings show enhancements proposed including part of the site to be maintained as enhanced grassland allowing natural species to grow and prosper, new native hedging, the planting of 11 new indigenous trees and the installation of bug hotels. This offers good opportunities for biodiversity enhancements which will be secured by condition. As such therefore, the scheme accords with the aims of the Strategy for Nature.

All material considerations as set out in the Land Planning and Development (Guernsey) Law, 2005 and the Land and Planning (General Provisions) Ordinance 2007 have been taken into account in the assessment of this application.

Based on the above, the application is considered compliant with the relevant Island Development Plan policies; it is therefore recommended that planning permission be granted, subject to conditions.
